Informal Amendment Process

- An informal amendment is the process by which over time many changes have been made to the Constitution which have not involved any changes in its written words.
- * Informal amendments are the result of government actions under the constitution.
- There are 5 methods of informally amending the Constitution

First Method

- * The passage of legislation by Congress
 - Congress has defined several provisions outlined in Article I Section 8 of the Constitution through the passage of basic laws
 - Congress has created a line of succession for the office of the President

Second Method

- * Actions taken by the President
 - * Presidents cannot declare war without the approval of Congress. However, many Presidents have ordered military actions as commander in-chief, without a formal war declaration.

Third method

- * Decisions of the Supreme Court
 - This is the most prevalent method used today.
 - Courts at all level make decision using the Constitution. With every judgement may also come an informal amendment to the Constitution

Fourth Method

- * Activities of Political Parties
 - The Constitution does not provide for a method of nominating candidates for the Presidential elections
 - Political Parties have adopted methods of electing candidates outside of the Constitution

Fifth Method

Customs

- Senatorial Courtesy provides for the approval of the State senator(s) for any presidential appointee of the same State
- Cabinet members by position are not prescribed in the Constitution
